**Thefts** - Most of you will be aware that we suffered a break in on the site over the Easter weekend. Sadly it is difficult to stop the determined thieves who cut through the perimeter fence to gain access. That said; we are fortunate on our site that these incidents are relatively rare compared to other sites in the area. More on this subject on page four.

**Skips** – These are being postponed till later in the year. However, we are hearing reports of 'fly-tipping' around the site. If you have rubbish on your plot, then *you* have to take responsibility for it, *do not dump* it elsewhere on the site.

**Dogs** – The committee have received complaints about dogs wandering around the site. All dogs that are brought onto the site by plot holders must remain on their leads at all times. Any dog poo must also be cleaned up immediately.

## May - Some To Do's

Typically May is one of the busiest months on the vegetable plot. The soil is warming up and the plants are growing well. Keep an eye on the weather for a last minute frost & keep some fleece handy to protect tender plants. So with that in mind, here are some jobs that you could be getting on with during May.

- May is the month to earth up your potatoes
- Thin out seedlings of crops sown last month, according to the spacing's on the packets
- Plant out Brussels sprouts, Summer cabbages, Celery, Celeriac & Leeks
- Sow Beetroot, Carrots, French Beans directly outside
- Courgettes, Squashes, Pumpkins, Marrows, Sweetcorn can be sown under cover
- If you have not done it yet put up your runner bean poles
- Continue weeding especially perennial weeds which will be starting to appear now if you get on top of them now, they'll be easier to control for the rest of the year. Hoe regularly to prevent annual weed seedlings growing.

#### Swarms

It is possible that Bee Swarms or colonies might crop up on the allotment site or indeed in members gardens. They can set themselves up in compost bins or sheds now that we are in the "swarming season".

If they can be definitely identified as honey bees as opposed to bumble bees or wasps, Steve Cook (our resident Bee Guru) would be pleased to investigate if it is possible to remove and re-site them into our new onsite Bee Enclosure which can be found at the end of row A/B.

# Removal of items from site/plots

The committee regrets that it needs to inform all Allotment Plot Holders about an incident involving a fellow tenant on Good Friday.

This individual was seen entering the communal shed and stealing a roll of steel mesh fencing, the property of Woodley Town Council (WTC).

Thanks to the vigilance of a fellow tenant, the culprit was identified, questioned and the incident reported to the council with a request that this person's tenancy is immediately terminated.

We are waiting on feedback from the council about this matter.

We can confirm that there is no relation between this incident and the pilfering that took place last year.

All thefts are a reminder that we should not let people on to the site without checking that they are tenants and that we should all lock the gate after leaving the site.

It is most important if you see something suspicious that you report it to the committee so that we can take the appropriate action.

In accordance with the AGM mandate, more covert cameras have been deployed around the site as we are determined to eradicate the petty pilfering that we experienced last year.

As mentioned in earlier newsletters, we expect to introduce new keys & locks for the site later this year. However, within the confines of the site, it really is down to each of us to act responsibly with regards to the property of others.

If it is not on your plot, then it is not yours to take!

Water Containers – We have been offered a large quantity of 15 litre water containers, the type used in water coolers. These are ideal for mini greenhouses once the bottom has been cut off.
