### Covid-19 (Coronavirus)

As we are all aware, the current Lockdown restrictions have started to be eased, as far as we understand (at the time of writing), visiting Allotments is still allowed. However, there is still a need to be aware of all the current restrictions/rules concerning the current health crisis and the changes as they occur over the coming weeks.

We still advise all plot holders to protect their hands when touching the gate/padlock when entering/leaving the site – please use the bin by the gate to dispose of any used gloves/masks.

**Bonfires** – Are still allowed until 30<sup>th</sup> April. Please be very considerate to local residents and check wind directions before lighting bonfires. Never leave bonfires unattended.

**Speeding** – Letters are being sent out during the first week of April to serial offenders still driving at excessive speed on the site. As we have pointed out before; this is not only dangerous, but also increases the 'wear & tear' on the various roads around the site. - **Please Reduce Your Speed On Site**.

## April – Some To Do's

April usually means that spring has truly arrived and we can get on with some serious planting. However; keep a weather eye out as there can always be those late frosts and even snow! Keep the 'Fleece' handy. With that in mind, here are some jobs that you could be getting on with.

- Finish planting any Onion Sets & Shallots
- Plant seed potatoes. Aim to get all your potatoes planted by the end of the month. Here's a handy <u>Potato Growing Guide</u> to help you along
- Sow main crop peas and make the last sowing of summer broad beans
- Sow under glass/greenhouse, the seeds of runner beans, sweet corn, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes, outdoor/ridge cucumber.
- Some other seeds to start off in the greenhouse/undercover include winter brassicas like cauliflower, broccoli, purple sprouting and brussels sprouts.
- Finish any Runner Bean trench's filled with kitchen waste & covered with soil
- Get that hoe sharpened as they're back! Weeding begins in earnest

### An allotment newbie? What next?

We've kept this item in for another month after a number of requests by new tenants. It's great to see so many new faces joining our community and although each will have received a revised welcome letter from the Committee; there are still many questions that new allotment holders have. So, we hope that this information will ease the 'now where do I start' feeling when taking on your first allotment.

What to grow? – Have a look at the chart on this page to give you a good idea of what you can grow and when it requires sowing/harvesting. Of course, some of this depends on what the soil is like on your plot, making a soil test will help you understand that. You can also ask other tenants what grows best.

**Crop Rotation** – The <u>RHS</u> defines this as 'The principle of crop rotation is to grow specific groups of vegetables on a different part of the vegetable plot.

This helps to reduce a build-up of crop-specific pest and disease problems and it organises groups of crops according to their cultivation needs.'

There is an amazing amount of online information about this subject – the newsletter editor works in a four year rotation – but you can also have a three year plan. Here's some more information about the subject.




