# July - Some To Do's

July is typically one of the hottest & driest months, so a lot of time can be spent watering. Watering in early morning or late evening reduces evaporation from the soil and encourages greater uptake by plants. Here are some other jobs that you can also tackle this month:

- You should be harvesting first early potatoes and perhaps some second earlies. They don't store well unlike the main crop, so enjoy them now.
- You can still sow summer cropping produce direct in the ground e.g. chicory, Chinese cabbage, kohl rabi, lettuce and many others
- Runner and climbing beans should be ready to harvest this month
- Now is the time to sow vegetables to harvest during the winter months, including kale, winter cabbage, red cabbage, over wintering spring cabbage and spinach.
- Keep an eye out for potato blight. A wet and humid end to July may bring this on quickly.
- Keep an eye out for other pests such as aphids, cabbage white butterfly caterpillars, white fly, pea moth and the dreaded carrot root fly. Use organic methods where possible to get rid of them.
- Keep hoeing to stay on top of those pesky weeds.

# To Dig or No-Dig, that is the question?

It's a subject that is widely discussed and a number of our tenants follow this practice as their preferred method of allotment cultivation.

For the unfamiliar, a No-dig method allows nature to carry out cultivation operations. Organic matter such as well rotted manure, compost, leaf mold, spent mushroom compost, old straw, etc., is added directly to the soil surface as a mulch at least 5-15 cm (2–6 in) deep, which is then incorporated into the soil by the actions of worms, insects and microbes. Worms and other soil life also assist in building up the soil's structure; their tunnels providing aeration and drainage, and their excretions bind together soil crumbs. This natural biosphere maintains healthy conditions in the upper soil horizons where annual plant roots thrive.

No-dig systems are said to be freer of pests and disease, possibly due to a more balanced soil population being allowed to build up in this undisturbed environment, and by encouraging the build-up of beneficial rather than harmful soil fungi. Moisture is also retained more efficiently under mulch than on the surface of bare earth, allowing slower percolation of water and less leaching of nutrients.



No-dig gardener Charles Dowding is a big advocate of this method and has been featured on many gardening programs such as Gardeners World.

Charles Dowding has an extensive website dedicated to No-Dig and also has his own newsletter which you can sign up to.





## Other Items

We still advise all plot holders to protect their hands when touching the gate/padlock when entering/leaving the site.
