NOVEMBER - Some To Do's

NOVEMBER is about harvesting more of this year's sowings. However, you can still plant out a few items. With that in mind, here are some jobs for this month.

- Keep harvesting this year's crops. If there is too much for your own use, consider donating some to the Launchpad Charity for their food runs. You can find them at the end of Jersey Knoll (Rows J/K). Do not leave any unused crops on your plot that will rot and perhaps harbour diseases
- It is a good time to plant garlic if the ground isn't frozen. Use netting to cover your cloves until they root to prevent birds pulling them up.
- Blackcurrants, redcurrants, whitecurrants and gooseberries can be pruned any time between November and March – <u>Gardeners World Tips</u> - Cut down autumn-fruiting raspberries as well.
- Check the stakes on your Brussels Sprouts.
- Cut back your yellowing asparagus foliage if you haven't already.
- Hold back on harvesting parsnips till we have had a frost, it will help improve the flavour.
- Keep hoeing to stay on top of any pesky weeds that may appear.




Planning your Allotment for next season

What to do with all those stones?

As you carry out your winter digging, you may come across lots of stones that you don't want to keep. Here's a suggestion for their use if you want to dispose of them.

Have a look along the road that runs by your plot and if there are some potholes in it, you can deposit the stones into the pothole. Level off the stones and as cars go over them, they will get pressed down into the hole. It's a good way of helping to keep the roads in a better condition, now that what look like a wet winter is here.
