Full details about the Seed Catalogue Sales can be found in Special Bulletin 83, which was sent out along with the November Newsletter.



DECEMBER - Some To Do's

December is here and daylight hours are in short supply this month. But if the weather allows, a few hours spent on the allotment will not only warm you up, you'll reap the benefits next year, too.

- Harvest Brussels sprouts when they are around one inch in diameter, before they 'blow open'. Pick them from the base of the plant up, twisting them away from the plant
- Do not forget the Parsnips, leeks and winter cabbages, all of which can be left in the ground until you need them. If frosts are forecast, cover the soil with some straw to make easier to dig them up
- It is not too late to lift and divide large clumps of rhubarb, replanting the outer sections into soil enriched with well-rotted manure
- There is not much that can planted outside during December, but perhaps some Onion seed inside ready for next spring
- It is a good time to start your Runner Bean trench for kitchen scraps
- December is a good time to carry out any plot maintenance and to clean/repair any tools that need it
- Lastly, order next years seeds from the <u>Catalogue by 7th December</u>.

So, we have searched the Internet to find some of the best advice/tips and listed them below (with trusted links). Some are quite old, but good advice never expires!




Planning your Allotment for next season

Other Items

Allotment Waiting List – The waiting list continues to reduce and is currently at **52.** The Committee on behalf of Woodley Town Council will be suspending allotment viewings during December as we reorganize several plots that the Council have handed back to the Committee.

This will include splitting some plots in half which will boost the number of vacant plots we have when we start plot viewings again in the New Year.

Away from your plot for an extended period? — Please let us know if you intend to be away from your plot for an extended time for any circumstance including illness & extended holidays so we can keep an eye on it for you and exempt it from any plot inspections.

Plot inspections – These will resume in the Spring of 2023.

Covid-19 Update - Covid continues to affect our lives in one way or another. The Committee would still ask all plot holders to continue to act responsibly when on the allotment site.

We still advise all plot holders to protect their hands when touching the gate/padlock when entering/ leaving the site. Plot holders must NOT wash their hands (or any of their tools) in the water tanks around the site. Please use your own container/bucket for this.

Allotment Waiting List.

A question was raised at the AGM in April about preferences for Allotment Plots been given to people not on the Woodley Town Council Allotment Waiting List. The Committee responded that as far as they were aware at the time there were no such preferences being given.

However, the Committee has recently been informed that WTC do have an agreement in place whereby Reading Council area residents that require an Allotment are being given preference over the WTC waiting list. The Reading/WTC agreement allows up to 50 plots being allocated under this agreement & currently stands at 38.
