# February – Some To Do's

February is here & hopefully we may be over the recent cold snap. Forecasts show an unsettled period for February which may allow us to spend a bit more time on the plot. So, here's some suggestions to think about:

- February is the best month to plant out garlic and shallots
- Prune late/autumn fruiting raspberries down as low as possible and mulch around them
- If you have any, check over chitting potatoes and begin to rub off any eyes that are unwanted leaving three or four well-spaced shoots
- Broad beans can be sown outside if the soil is not frozen or waterlogged
- Keep filling up your runner bean trench with kitchen scraps. Make sure to
  cover the filled bits with soil to stop vermin eating. If you don't have one,
  start it now as it will keep the plants feed through the growing season
- Bare-rooted fruit trees and bushes can be planted
- Mid-February onwards is a good time to sow tomato and cucumber seed for greenhouse growing
- Finish off any plot maintenance and make sure to clean/repair any tools that need it
- Set out Cloches to warm up the seed bed soil

# Onion (Allium) Leaf Miner





As we all get ready for the coming growing season, one pest to watch out for is onion leaf miner or allium leaf miner. The larvae of this fly bore into the stems and bulbs of leeks, onions, chives and garlic causing the leaves to twist and the bulbs to be deformed.

We have pulled together some handy hints and tips from around the web. If you have any handy hints as tips, then let us know and we will out them in a future Newsletter. Here's some initial tips.

**Crop covering** – Invest in some insect-proof mesh and cover onions, garlic and leeks after planting, before female flies lay their eggs on the crop (see links for details).

**Crop rotation** – Don't plant this year's crop in the same ground where you grew last years crop. Adult flies hatch from pupae overwintering in the soil.

**Pesticide control** - None of the pesticides available to home gardeners for use on leeks, onions and allied plants is likely to give control of allium leaf miner.





# Other Items
